An old friend sent me something he'd written, which included the following:

"Nearly 60 years ago now, John Kennedy asked us to consider what we could do for our country, not what it could do for us. Our country needs us more than ever!

In our 21st Century Patriotism we will replace our petty complaints about excessive taxation with a recognition that no tax rate is too high to justify the bounty our nation provides to us. And our 21st Century patriotism will not tolerate the

squandering of those resources or their diversion for private aggrandizement or wealth...

As a part of our 21st Century Patriotism, we will have replaced some of the trappings of

privilege with the privilege of serving our country for 2 to 3 years between the ages of 18 and 31.

In 21st Century Patriotism, we have replaced pledges and loyalty oaths with actions and service and true commitment...

In our 21st Century Patriotism, we have realized that we can have an 'us' without needing or identifying a 'them.'

In our 21st Century Patriotism, we have replaced 'keeping up with the Joneses' with 'LIFTING up the Joneses'...and the Chins and the Goldbergs and Mohammeds and the O'Malleys and the Gonzalez."

He says he is not running for office, but I think we could use people with similar dreams. When I knew Alex, we were young adults, full of ideas and idealism. Some of our friends have grown less idealistic over time, but Alex is still "fighting the good fight."

I am grateful that I still know him, and I am grateful that my life is filled with even more people who are fighting the good fight than I ever thought possible—including many people in this congregation. Thank you, all, for the goodness and hope you create every day.

SPIRAL: Samhain Ghost Supper Wednesday, November 1, 7 pm

The Wheel turns to Samhain . . .

Ghost Supper, Dumb Supper, Silent Supper, call it what you will. Whichever you call it, the celebration of Samhain (pronounced Sow' en) will take place on Wednesday, November 1. Ritual begins at 7 pm sharp, doors open at 6:30. We will dine by candlelight in the conference room, and we will invite our beloved who have passed to the Summerland to join us. Places will be set at each table for those you hope to contact. Bring one of their favorite dishes to the

potluck, and put a bit on the guest plate so that they will feel welcome. Pictures and amulets of the departed are welcome, too.

It is said that the curtain between the living and the dead is at its thinnest on Samhain. It is an age old tradition that has been adopted by many cultures -- as All Saints Day and Day of the Dead, or Dia de los Muertos, to name a couple.

Once the circle is cast, the candles are lit, lights are turned off, and there will be silence. When the bell is rung after the meal, the silence is broken. At that time, we will open the circle and have time for those who want to share.

This is a high holy day on the Pagan Wheel of the Year, and a beautiful experience. We hope you will join us. All adults are welcome. Teens who can remain quiet for an hour are also welcome. You do not have to be a Pagan to be moved by this ritual.
