
On Sundays in August, weather permitting, the Care Committee will hold Tai Chi classes in our courtyard at 9:30 am. Beginners welcome!

Peace and Justice Committee

Thanks to your generosity last month our *Share the Plate* collection allowed us to send \$445 to 466 WORKS. It is a local community development organization founded by Mount Carmel Missionary Baptist Church that focuses its efforts on improving the infrastructure, safety, and quality of residential housing in South Bend's Southeast Neighborhood.

This month our Share the Plate collection will go to Bowman Creek Educational Ecosystem (BCe2), which also started in the Southeast Neighborhood. It is an independent non-profit organization that has a summer internship program now in its third year. The focus is on regional talent development, with the current intern team comprised of students from 13 local universities, college state campuses, community colleges, and high schools. The interns are studying 13 different disciplines, and we believe that our success stems from the variety of perspectives that our team members bring. An internship like no other, BCe2 provides an environment where students can take risks, exercise creativity, and apply what they learn in the classroom to create real impact in the community. Of note,

our own Willow Crisovan is an intern with Bowman Creek this summer.

Their model of an educational ecosystem brings people from different backgrounds different sectors educational -institutions. local government, community organizations-- together to tackle our community's most challenging problems. They started in the Southeast neighborhood of South Bend, where the revitalization of Bowman Creek catalyzed their work and their commitment shaped to economic, and environmental sustainability from the very beginning. Now, they use this same framework in a variety of projects, working with neighborhood residents to build our shared community. By the way. this spring we were a recipient of a grant from BCe2 for our Rain Gardens!

News from the Board

Board Meeting Notes - July

At the Annual Meeting in May, there was a call for more regular information to be disseminated by the Board to congregation. Your Board Secretary (Melanie Smith-Guillaume) will make every effort to get a summary to the office to go in the newsletter each month. Also realize that these notes are from the Draft Minutes. The minutes are not finalized until they are voted on at the following month's meeting. Finances

- The budgeted deficit for FY 2017-2018 was \$14,283, but the actual deficit was \$5,362.74, much better than we had projected. There may still be small adjustments to the total but the shortfall will be taken care of with unrestricted savings.
- So far pledges are at \$147,535 with about 20 people out. The Stewardship Committee will follow up with these people.

President's Update

Singe the Mortgage Campaign Successful!

Our campaign to pay down the mortgage on the church building culminated in the payment of \$75,000 to 1st Source Bank on June 29, 2018, to reduce our mortgage balance to \$163,332.41. The mortgage started at \$400,000 four years ago.

The pay-down has the effect of allowing us to lower our monthly mortgage payments from \$2,700 per month to \$1,914.15 per month, thus relieving pressure on our annual operating budget. We will benefit from these

annual savings through the remaining term of the mortgage which is scheduled to be paid off in 2028.

Thanks to all who contributed, as well as those who helped in other ways, to take this important step in keeping the Church on solid financial footing for the years ahead. And, if you'd still like to help, the Church's Building Fund is still open to donations for not-yet-scheduled roof repairs and other related improvements.
