Minister's Notes

What DOES a 21st-century religious education program look like? What do families need from their congregational community, in these post-modern times? As we imagine searching for a new Religious Education Coordinator, we are taking a step back and re-thinking what our RE program ought to look and feel like.



Parents and families are invited to provide their input in a variety of ways.

We'll have conversations with parents/caregivers. Rev. Chip and others will meet one-on-one with anyone who wants to talk; and there will be a survey, for those who don't have time for face-to-face meetings.

If you want to participate, and explain what your family needs from our congregation, please contact Rev. Chip, Anne Mannix, Susan Van Fleit, or Chuck Leone.

Rev. Chip will preach on how religious education and faith formation has changed over the last century, on October 14 ("The Great End of Religious Education").

Meanwhile, as we figure all this out, we'll continue to welcome older children into the sanctuary on Sunday mornings (Diana Mendelsohn hosts a table at the back, and there are busy bags with activities and crayons). Younger children (four and under) can play in the nursery with Henry DeBeck (son of the Rev. Ms. Amy DeBeck, in Elkhart).

Board News

September Board Meeting Highlights

The Board is continuing to work on finding an Interim RE Director, reinvigorating the RE Committee, and planning for the RE program for the fall. If you have input, please contact Rev. Chip or Chuck Leone.

The Board will be sending a message to all Committees to ask them to study the section of the Strategic Plan that relates to their area. The Board would like to have a sense of what direction their response will take.

As of October 1, there will be virtually no more announcements during the Sunday services other than from the Pulpit Host. This will make it easier for our hard-ofhearing members and will save some time. Announcements may be handed to the Pulpit Host up until 5 minutes before the service.

The Board is wants to set up a Crisis Response Team to work on an Emergency Plan for the Church. See Chuck Leone if you are interested.

At the end of the fiscal year in June, a transfer of \$1,100 was made to the Endowment Fund -- \$1000 was an Operating budget repayment on our building loan from the Endowment Fund, while the other \$100 was a Memorial donation.

Marioe Gortner became a Bible Belt star when he was ordained as a minister in 1949 at age 4. He and his parents toured the country, raking in offerings from eager crowds, until Marjoe's father absconded with the money eight years later. Marjoe broke away from the evangelical circuit for a time, then returned in his late teens. His audiences never knew that he was no longer a believer. Later, in his 20's Marjoe made a break once and for all when he repudiated the religious show-biz life he'd been forced to lead by his fundamentalist parents. He invited a film crew to follow him on his last tour, and he discusses his performances afterwards. The movie is a fascinating expose of how some prey on religious people.
