- Donate a Tangible Item: ND or Civic Theatre tickets, handmade items (including food items), and unique new or gently used items (pottery, paintings, etc.). Please Note: Most of these items will be included in our Silent Auction.
- Solicit Business Donations: We encourage everyone to ask your favorite local businesses to donate an item (or two). Donations might include event tickets, gift certificates, merchandise, and use passes. Before you ask for business donations, please check with Kathy Platt, who keeps an ongoing list of business solicitations, and obtain a Business donation Receipt (online pdf or in the church foyer) to pass on to the business for their tax documentation.

Donation FAQs

***** What is our Annual Auction?

This is our largest fundraiser of the year. It's also our biggest social event of the year, complete with a theme (for which you can wear a costume, if the mood strikes you!), a delicious meal, a running comedy show, great music, and lots of enthusiastic Unitarian Universalists. The funds raised support the ongoing activities and programs of the church (operating budget). If you are new to First Unitarian, the Auction is also a great way to get to know others and discover common interests, as well as make purchases, such as a place at a fun event, a service (gardening, meal delivered to your home), or local business gift certificates, that benefit the church.

***** How does our Auction Work?

People in the congregation think of events (themed parties, nature experiences, special meals, family ventures, etc.), services (yard work, babysitting, meals delivered, etc.), or tangible items (handmade items, event tickets, etc.) they can donate, or ask local businesses they frequent to donate items (such as gift certificates, tickets, passes, gift baskets, etc.). All donations for both the *Live* and *Silent* Auctions are listed in a catalog which, so you can plan your bidding in advance, we make available in print and online the Sunday before the Auction.

! I'm interested in donating something, how do I know what will sell?

If you are not sure what to donate, look through recent Auction catalogs (available on Sundays) or ask our Auction Chair for ideas on how to transform your obsession (waffles, hula-hoop, fondue, haiku, campfires) into a donation. *Most often*, events are co-hosted. You can ask our Auction Chair for suggestions of co-hosts.

***** When I know what I want to donate, how and when do I submit it?

You can submit your donation online (preferred) or use a paper form. You will find a link to the Auction webpage on the church's homepage (firstunitarian.us). On the Auction webpage you will find detailed instructions for online submissions (via an auction software vendor) and links to paper Donation Forms in pdf.
