

Event FAQs

***** How can I participate in the fundraising without donating an item?

Just attend this fun event, and, if you are able, purchase something from the *Silent or Live* **Auction.** We strive to offer items and events for diverse income levels. Hopefully you will find something within your means. We list all items in a catalog that is available in print or online the Sunday before the Auction (10/13). This allows you to plan your bidding in advance; or, if unable to attend, ask someone else to bid for you.

***** What happens on the night of the Auction?

The evening begins at 6 pm with a casual meal, bid number paddle pickup in the sanctuary and time to peruse the *Silent* Auction in the Conference Room. Beer & wine, and a special drink are available at a cash bar. The meal includes gluten free, vegan & vegetarian options. The *Live* Auction begins about 7 pm.

* Is childcare provided?

Yes, including a free child-friendly meal! *But, for planning purposes, we do ask you to RSVP with the number and ages of your children*. You can email the Auction Team (auction@firstunitarian.us) or register your children online at (http://communityauctionservices.com/register/1u-sb2019).

***** How does the *Live* Auction work?

Items are offered in catalog order. The auctioneer reads a description of each item, along with its opening price and the quantity offered. (Events are sold per person/place.) Those interested in bidding on the item raise their paddles. The price increases until the number of bidders equals the number of items offered. – *During the Live Auction, you can also buy a joke!*

***** How does the *Silent* Auction work?

You have approximately two hours to peruse the items in the conference room and bid on as many as you would like. You may return at any time to outbid someone. The top bidder wins the item!

❖ How and when do I pay and get my purchases?

Our accounting team keeps a tally sheet for each bidder. Any Silent Auction purchases (winning bids) are added in. Payment by check or cash is due Auction night. Tangible items are sent home with you. A confirmation of events & services is sent within the next two weeks.

Foster Grandparent Program



My name is Georgia Turvey and I am a social work intern with the Foster Grandparent Program here at REAL Services. Our program sends seniors age 55 and older into schools and childcare facilities to mentor "at-risk" children. The teachers identify 3 or more students who are falling behind in areas such as reading, writing, math, self-esteem, socialization, etc. and assigns them to a Foster Grandparent to help them improve. The Foster Grandparents serve a minimum of 15 to 20 hours a week and earn an hourly stipend of \$2.65 if they meet income requirements. A Foster Grandparent can also serve without a stipend if they do not meet the income requirements. We are especially in need of male Foster Grandparents. You can email me with any questions, or I can put you in contact with the Director of the program, Noel Matthews. I look forward to working with you in cultivating our future leaders.
