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Draft Congregational Meeting Minutes

First Unitarian Church, South Bend

Annual Congregational Meeting

May 17, 2020

I. Introduction

- A. The meeting was called to order on Zoom by President Ron Robinson at 12 noon.
- B. The secretary verified that we had a quorum of 50 members present.
- C. We recited the covenant.
- D. Approval of the minutes of the Annual Meeting of May 19, 2019. Kevin Barry made a motion to approve the minutes as written. Susan Van Fleit seconded. The motion passed with 35 votes and 1 abstention.

II. Reports

- A. Minister's Report Chip said that he was impressed with how the congregation had handled the transition to meeting by Zoom.
- B. President's Report Ron pointed out that his focus for his year as President was relational, the importance of our relationships. He has seen during the year that we mean a lot to each other, that we depend on each other and that we are continuing to grow.

C. Treasurer's Report and Budget

- 1. For Fiscal year 2019-2020, there was a surplus of \$2,078 which was placed in the General Fund.
- 2. This year there is a projected surplus of \$8,700 because of cost-saving measures, reduced spending and a record income from the auction.
- 3. This year we also applied for a PPP loan, which was calculated for \$16,000, to be used for payroll expenses (75%) and utilities and mortgage (25%). Once it is used in a directed way (reported on a spreadsheet by our Bookkeeper Finda and spent within 8 weeks of receipt), this loan will be forgiven. It was received on May 8th.
- 4. Elena explained some of the items in the proposed budget.
 - a. Line 130 Loose offering income was reduced because we are not meeting in person to pass the basket on Sundays.
 - b. Line 143 Service Auction Last year's auction income was high, so income from the auction was returned to a more average figure.
 - c. Line 205 Mortgage expenses for 2020-21 include the \$3,000 Endowment disbursal to be voted on at the Annual Meeting.
 - d. Line 220 Cleaning Services were reduced because of less use.
 - e. Line ??? After line 999, Leadership Expenses This is a new line not yet numbered, for expenses to send the new President and the CRE to Leadership School. This does not cover all the expenses, but expenses will be less this year because the School will be virtual.

- f. The budget deficit comes to \$23,693.
 - 1). There are several items that decrease this deficit, however.
 - a). 2019-2020 projected surplus

b). PPP loan not included in budget 16,000

- 2). So the deficit of \$23,693 will be offset by the credits above.
- 5. Elena also pointed out that the remaining principal owed on our building loan as of May 5, 2020, is \$143,879.
- 6. Discussion of the Budget.
 - a. Susan Van Fleit noted that Buildings and Grounds on Line 240 should be separated. Elena said that was planned but hadn't yet been done.
 - b. Chip Roush said that the cleaning of the building needed to continue because there are staff members in the building and that people who do go into the building need to disinfect after themselves.
 - c. Barbara Williams wondered why security on Line 360 had been reduced. Elena explained that last year some repairs had been made and the expense had been included. This year there are no repairs planned.
 - d. Barbara also asked if we had any interest-bearing accounts because there was no line for interest. Elena said that former CDs were put into our checking account, but she would check on this.
 - e. Barbara also asked if we had a sabbatical account. Line 920 is 0. Chip said that we have no money to put into that account. Elena said that the \$100 is put in at the end of the year.
 - f. Tamara Ciszczon asked how we were planning to account for the PPP money. Suzanne said that First Source Bank had given us guidelines, that we have gotten advice on a money management list serve through the UUA and that we have consulted the US government website. Elena also consulted with Chuck Leone. Suzanne feels confident that we are satisfying the government requirements for accounting for the funds.
 - g. Tamara also asked which salaries were included in figuring the amount of money we applied for in the PPP loan. Suzanne answered that only salaries of employees on the payroll were included according to the government rules. We have 4 employees on our payroll Rev. Chip Roush, Rich Wallace, Peg Faulmann and Finda Kamanda, our bookkeeper. The building cleaner, childcare attendant and pianist are considered contractors for the purposes of the loan grant.
 - h. Lynn McDonald asked why on Line 809, actual expenditure for the CRE salary was less than budgeted. Rich was volunteering for the beginning of his tenure as CRE and that was his decision.
 - I. Jessica Collett asked if we had looked into ways to supplement the loose offering. Suzanne Waller says she is looking into ways to make it easier to give electronically. But many services charge a fee. Paying electronically through a bank checking/savings account has no fee.
 - j. Alan Hamlet wanted to know if the choir could continue to pay Ian for work he does. Elena said that he could be paid as long as the choir has enough money in its budget.

- k. Melanie thanked all the people who worked on the budget and the application for the PPP funds.
- l. Kay Azar made a motion to approve the budget as presented. Alan Hamlet seconded. The motion passed unanimously.
- D. Covid Task Force Report Chuck Leone reported that the Task Force is new and small. They are gathering information. They feel that we are nowhere near close to opening the building. Anyone interested in joining this effort is welcome. They are working on line.

E. Other reports

- 1. The other reports were reviewed with no comments.
- 2. Kathy Platt, speaking for the Events Committee, said she was concerned about the auction this coming year. This is our biggest fundraiser. Will it be on line? She also said that the Social Committee was inactive because we are not having coffee or food for coffee hour after church.

III. Endowment Committee Recommendations

- A. Joseph Gress reported that the guidelines for disbursements from the Endowment Fund allowed for \$15,000 in disbursements this year. But the total for proposals far exceeded that number.
 - 1. The Endowment Committee recommends that \$3,000 be approved for paying principal on the mortgage if necessary.
 - 2. The Endowment Committee recommends postponing any decision about other disbursements until the Corona virus crisis has been resolved.
- B. A motion was made to approve the two recommendations of the Endowment Committee by Gail deSomer and seconded by Kevin Barry. The motion passed 30 yes, 2 no, 3 abstentions.

IV. Election of Officers and Trustees, Endowment Committee, Nominating Committee

- A. Slate of Officers and Trustees

- 2. Alan Hamlet made a motion to approve the slate of officers and Ruth Regan seconded. The motion passed unanimously.
- 3. Ron Robinson called for nominations from the floor for the position of Secretary. Hearing none, he asked for people to call him or Chuck Leone for suggestions for filling this position.

B. Endowment Committee Nominee

- 1. Member (3 year term) Chuck Leone
- 2. Alan Hamlet made a motion to elect Chuck Leone to the Endowment Committee for a three year term. Kevin Barry seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

- C. Nominating Committee Nominees
 - Chair Person (one year term) Ron Robinson Member (2 year term) — Kathy Platt Alternate (2 year term) — Susan Van Fleit
 - 2. Anne Mannix made a motion to approve the slate of nominees for the Nominating Committee. Alan Hamlet seconded. The motion passed unanimously.
- **V. Volunteer of the Year Award** Ron Robinson announced the recipients of this year's Volunteer of the Year Award.
 - A. Jim Ward, for his work organizing multiple concerts, lawn mowing and many other contributions.
 - B. Garry Roberson, for his work on the grounds and with the Memorial Garden Committee.

VI. Other Business and Adjournment

- A. Ron called for a moment of silence to remember three members who died this year and to honor their contributions to the church. Roger Birdsell, Mary Bethe, Dale Gibson
- B. The meeting was adjourned at 1:25.

Unfortunately, we are still besieged by the COVID-19 pandemic. At our Annual Meeting we will have been gathering online for 14 months. Many of us have been vaccinated now, and are beginning to feel more comfortable going out in public again. However, many of us are not or cannot be vaccinated—including our children and youth—so it will be a while before we'll do a lot of in-person church. With a fervent wish that next year's Annual Report will be the last to mention COVID-19 and its variants, let us move on to happier news.

Our congregation really rose to the challenge this year. Not only did our staff adapt and thrive in this new landscape, so did our committees and members. People took it on themselves to check in on each other, delivering groceries and maintaining connections. We still contributed to our community, regularly gathering food and clothing to donate to the swelling ranks of our neighbors in need. We formed many new groups—educational, spiritual and social. We even held our annual Auction (several, actually, both via email and on Zoom). I am deeply grateful to everyone who went above and beyond, to keep our church vital.

In particular, we learned how to do *First Zuumitarian* pretty well. We have a subcommittee of talented people working to make it so that our members and friends can participate in church events both in-person and via Zoom. Zoom will help us be more inclusive and accessible, long into the future.

Finally, I want to express my gratitude for all the support during and after my hospitalization. Now that I have my medications at the proper dosage, my depression has subsided. I keep up my spiritual practices every day, which helps a great deal, and I talk to good therapists. I know that *many* people did extra work to keep the church operating smoothly, while I endeavored to get re-centered. To the staff, the Board, the Committee on Ministry, and to each person who put in extra effort or reached out with encouraging words, I am deeply grateful.

President's Report Melanie Smith-Guillaume

Taking over the presidency of the Board in July was an unexpected event for me. I was looking forward to going off the Board after four years as Secretary of the Board; yet when Suzanne Waller had to leave abruptly, I found myself volunteering to become

President. I am very happy that I did. From the very beginning at mid-pandemic, I felt that our major task for the year would be to nurture and preserve our community by bringing us as close as possible for support and comfort despite our isolation.

The Board has worked very hard to keep in touch with you, the members and friends of the congregation. We hosted two Town Hall meetings to update you and used the Chirp to communicate weekly. We distributed activity bags to the children several times during the year (kudos to Gail DeSomer, Kathy Platt and delivery drivers).

Committees have been active as well. Events Chair, Kathy Platt, organized Auction Chirps to replace our normal Auction and then conducted a successful Zoom Auction. The Care Committee has continued its good work calling, delivering food, writing cards, and offering words of comfort and hope. Other committees particularly, Grounds, Peace and Justice (with monthly drives to support the Broadway Christian Parish), Worship Arts, Committee on Ministry, RE, Endowment, Finance, Membership, and Stewardship, have continued their work. We formed a COVID Task Force, which has informed the Board about the changing requirements from all levels of government and the UUA, so we can make informed judgements.

Ongoing opportunities for support have been Rev. Chip's Tuesday and Thursday chat sessions, now with the help of Becky Lindstrom on Tuesday. Rev. Byrd continues her weekly before-church discussions and has offered several workshops. Kathy Smeets offers a weekly Metta Prayer meditation after church. Chip has offered everything from game nights to grief sessions.

Unfortunately, we have lost a number of members this year, Bob Cope, Dan French, Don Irmiger, and Bette Asplund. We held Memorial Services for Bob and Dan. We hold them all in our memory.

We've welcomed four new members, Lynn Liston, Pat Littlejohn, David Groff and Ken Chambers (returning). One new baby has joined us, Michael Dhom, son of Maggie and Phillip and brother of Charlie.

Planning for the future when we can be reunited in person is underway. Safety and inclusion are our two major concerns. The COVID Task Force has developed detailed safety procedures for groups who may be using the church, though presently only a limited number of Board-approved groups are allowed. A Tech Committee has been working on how we can conduct hybrid services so that zoom participants may participate fully with those who are simultaneously attending in-person services at the church. In June, we are planning a Restart Meeting conducted by Lisa Presley, our UUA regional liaison, to reconsider how we share responsibilities for our ministries between Chip and the congregation. The coming transition from pandemic mode is a perfect time for us to re-evaluate our expectations, goals, vision and purpose.

Treasurer's Report, Elena Wake Finance Documents Submitted by Finda Kamanda

EALTH We ended the last fiscal year (2019-2020) with a surplus of \$22,683 despite the projected \$21,527

deficit in the budget, thanks to the Paycheck Protection Plan (PPP) loan, a part of COVID-19 relief funds. Reimbursement of the loan was forgiven as we used the loan to pay payrolls, mortgage and utilities following the guideline.

This year (2020-2021) the Stewardship campaign received pledges of \$146,500. The operating budget forecasted a large deficit of \$23,243. We stopped gathering in our church building in late March 2020 due to COVID-19 pandemic. Closure of the building had a considerable impact on the finances, minimizing many expenses such as electricity, committee expenses and RE related expenses, while we received a steady pledge income. We are expecting a balanced budget at the end of the year if current trends as of publishing of this report continue.

The Stewardship drive for the next fiscal year (2021-2022) so far reported \$147,700 pledges and we are expecting a few more members' responses. In spite of financial surpluses for the last few years, our budget is still in a tight place, and we had to cut back on many expenditures. We appreciate the generosity of our members and friends for financial and service contributions.

- 2) For the New Year (2021-2022), the board approved a 2% salary increase for the minister following the UUA guideline.
- 3) For the New Year (2021-2022), the premium increases by 10% in July 2021 and possibly again in 2022.
- 4) For the New Year (2021-2022), the board approved a 2% wage increase for the office assistant and \$18/hr for the bookkeeper following the UUA guideline. Our current wage for DRE satisfies the guideline.

- 1) For details of Endowment Disbursements, see Table 4 below. The additional \$5 in the balance here compared to the Total in Table 4 is due to a \$5 residual balance in a 2017-18 grant completed in its first year and not shown in Table 4.
- 2) This fund holds donations until we meet the minimum deposit requirement for the UU Common Endowment Fund. .
- 3) On June 30, 2020, we transferred the 2019-2020 Operating Budget Surplus (see Table 1) of \$22,682.51 from the Operating Fund to Unrestricted Savings. This transfer is reflected in the 6-30-2020 balance.
- 4) \$1,600 designated for the defibrillator, was transferred from Endowment Disbursements to Endowment Set Aside. The money was returned to the UU Common Endowment Fund.
- 5) \$3,900 was transferred from Prepaid Pledges to the General Fund at the beginning of the 2020-2021 fiscal year.
- 6) \$412 of unused funds for the defibrillator was transferred from Special Projects into the General Fund.

Children's Religious Education Program Report, Rich Wallace

The children's religious education program was impacted this past year by the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition to not being able to meet in person, none of the children had interest in more on-line content nor did their parents have an appetite for trying to get them to participate.

In the fall I sent out a letter to our families to see if there was a way for the RE program or the church in general to provide help to them or their children. Of the half-dozen or so responses, the most common reply was they were fine and just spending time together. However, we did match a family with some volunteers that gave them some reprieve with childcare and some meals.

With help from church members outside the RE committee, we sent care bags out with activities and treats in October, December, February, and March. In the March packets, the teens received a mindfulness journal to help them in a way that they could do as they were comfortable in time as they saw fit.

Since we couldn't see them in person at the church building I tried to get children to read, or parents to read to their children, for the Story for All Ages as much as possible. We've also collected plastic caps, initially hoping the kids could help with the project while learning about the impacts of plastics on the environment. We collected the plastic without the benefit of the gathering. I'm going to try to work in some programming over the summer so that we can move this project forward.

I would like to thank the RE Committee: Katie and Eli Williams, Megan Sulok, and our board liaison, Becky Lindstrom for their input and guidance over the year. I'd also like to thank board president, Melanie Smith-Guillaume, and board member, Gail deSomer, for their interest, guidance, and efforts with our program. As usual, if there is an area where help is needed, then Kathy Platt is there. The gift bag projects were no exception and we thank Kathy for helping. Of course we owe some thanks to the drivers who distributed them too.

Lastly, I'd like to thank Rev. Roush for working with me and being supportive of our endeavors and of me even through personal loss and illness.

COVID-19 Task Force, Chuck Leone



The Covid Task Force was formed in March, 2020, by the Church's Board of Trustees after the initial closure of the Church building, with the task to monitor the ongoing pandemic and resulting health recommendations, precautions and restrictions with the goal of reopening the Church

building for in-person use when safe. Task Force members are Chuck Leone, Mary Hagen, Tamara Ciszczon and Rin Adams.

The Task Force has been following the Johns Hopkins risk assessment model as reported in the New York Times as it applies to St. Joseph County, Indiana. In its report to the Board on April 13, 2021, the Task Force noted that St. Joseph County was still considered at "very high risk" for virus transmission with 36 cases per 100,000 population (by comparison, Indiana as a whole was at 16 cases/100,000). By May 4, St. Joseph County was down to 27 cases/100,000 (Indiana was at 17 cases/100,000). The unknown risk posed by new virus variants in our region is also a concern. However, the Task Force has begun to consider situations in which the Church building can be used by small groups where participants have been vaccinated and certain protocols are in place. That process is under development at this time.

We can't predict when we will be able to return to full use of the Church building as we have used it before, but we expect the return process to be somewhat incremental as we learn what we can do safely.

Committee Reports

Adult Religious Education Committee: Gail deSomer, Chair

Three classes based on Bart Ehrman's books were taught in March by Rev. Byrd, meeting on Zoom. Bart Ehrman is a professor at Chapel Hill in North Carolina. His emphasis is on the New Testament and Early Christianity which he approaches as an historian, not a theologian. His insights as an historian are extremely helpful in understanding the origins of how Christianity morphed from its inception. The topics covered were: "Misquoting Jesus," "The History of Heaven and Hell," and "How Jesus became God."

Rev. Chip offered two discussion groups on Zoom on "White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk about Racism," by Robin DiAngelo

Barbara Williams and Marilyn Shaul coordinated the "Great Decisions" course, developed by the Foreign Policy Association each year. The Foreign Policy Association was formed after WWI to educate the population about foreign affairs and to encourage support for the League of Nations. The Great Decisions program studies current issues (such as Globalization, Migration, etc.) facing our nation. In 2020, 11 participants read a briefing book article, watched a 30 minute video by international experts, and then held a group discussion in the church conference room. When the church closed in March, the group completed the 2020 program by watching the video on YouTube, then discussing the topic on Zoom. The 2021 program is available and the plan is for the program to start in May for the first 3 sessions till the church venue is again available—perhaps holding the discussions outdoors.

Other activities that were available: a Zoom discussion every Sunday morning prior to church hosted by Byrd Tetzlaff, Zoom discussions every Tuesday and Thursday, a Metta Prayer group on Zoom led by Kathy Smeets every Sunday after church, and a Poetry Prompt group.

Endowment Committee Annual Report and Recommendations: Chuck Leone, Chair

The Endowment Committee received three proposals for funding for the 2021-22 Church year and recommends

funding all of them in the full amounts requested. They are:

- A proposal from the Grounds Committee to clean up the north yard area and then install a stamped concrete patio of about 400 square feet with a walk connecting to the existing sidewalk. \$4,200.00
- A proposal from the Technology Task Force to enhance the ability of the Church to livestream services, under circumstances when some participants may be on site and others online. \$7,000.00
- A proposal from the Finance Committee to pay down the principal on the Church's mortgage. \$5,000.00

The total of these proposals is \$16,200.00, which exceeds the disbursement guidelines by less than \$600.00, but the Committee recommends funding in full for all proposals, in light of the fact that 1) all of the proposals are appropriate for funding under current circumstances, and 2) only one endowment fund proposal was partially funded in the amount of \$3,000.00 at last year's annual meeting.
